Our aims are to help people live healthy, independent lives within their community and combat social isolation. Our office on Builth Wells High Street also provides a focal point for volunteering and general information.

We have a team of volunteers who provide services to the Builth Wells community and the surrounding area (see membership area below)


These services include the Community Car Scheme, Monthly Outings and a Lunch Club, as well as others.

Demand for these services continues to grow and each year we face a challenge to raise sufficient funds to meet demand.

Community Support has three main funding sources: grants, donations and funds raised in our charity shop.

With continuing reductions in statutory funding, each year we face a budget shortfall and have to raise money through donations, fundraising activities and the takings from our shop.

Chairman's Report

This year has been a busy one and has seen a number of changes for BWCS, ending of course with the huge impact that the outbreak of Coronavirus and the start of lockdown in March 2020 has had on us all.

For a number of reasons, we took the decision to no longer act as a general volunteer bureau and to concentrate our resources and efforts on our own volunteers and services. However, BWCS remains committed to volunteering and continues to work with other agencies to ensure that potential volunteers get a wide range of opportunities and support.

The start of 2019 was not promising in terms of finances, the reduction in statutory grants and the loss of volunteer bureau funding meant that everyone had to work hard to ensure that we could move into 2020 with a minimum deficit. It is to the credit of both staff and trustees that this was achieved. . We were grateful in particular to the Friends of Health Care in Builth Wells who committed themselves to giving BWCS an annual grant for three years, and to the Builth Co-op who in October 2019 chose us as one of the charities to receive the 1% from Co-op members over the whole of the year. 2019 also saw the start of our 200+ Club giving people the opportunity to take part in monthly cash draws and support BWCS at the same time; I am delighted to report that it has been a great success attracting more than the 200 members needed to make it viable.

On another financial matter, I am pleased to let you know that we recruited Andrew Cook as a new Trustee who will take over as Treasurer at the beginning of April. I am immensely grateful to Ian Phillips who stands down after a number of years of hard work keeping BWCS on the financial straight and narrow.

It is with great sadness that I have to tell you that this year we lost someone who has supported BWCS as a trustee and volunteer for many years. John Seed died suddenly and unexpectedly in January and will be a great loss; we were touched that his family chose to make BWCS one of the recipients of donations made at his funeral.

We are also saying goodbye to a loyal Trustee who is standing down this year. Judy Davies has been a stalwart supporter of BWCS for many years and we would like to thank her for everything she has done.

The start of 2020 brought the floods to Builth Wells, and the Lunch Club had to be suspended as the Jubilee Hall was badly affected, the plans to find an alternate venue are now of course on hold.

The impact of Coronavirus on BWCS will be dealt with fully in next year's report but I cannot finish without paying tribute to our staff. Despite not knowing if there would be sufficient funds to keep BWCS going, they rapidly assessed the needs of our residents during lockdown and re-organised services and systems to ensure that anyone in Builth who was vulnerable or in need would be supported. My thanks also go to my fellow trustees who have worked tirelessly on grant applications and fund raising.

anticipate that 2020/21 will be a challenging year; the staff and Board are already starting to plan how we can best operate in what may be a changed world, but I can assure you that we will continue to put the needs of Builth people at the heart of all that we do, and I want to thank everyone who continues to support us in so many ways.




Community Car Scheme

This scheme continues to play a very important role for people in our rural area, where public transport is not readily available or accessible.

The scheme provides transport for essential journeys. Our Volunteers use their own cars and are paid mileage expenses, passengers make a contribution to the cost of the journey and the balance of the Volunteer expenses is now funded by our own charity shop and a donation from the Friends of Healthcare in Builth Wells.

The map below shows the top 10 places our drivers travelled to this year. In addition to those shown, other destinations include Aberystwyth, Carmarthen, Ebbw Vale, Leominster, Merthyr, Newtown, Pontypool, Rhayader, Swansea, and Worcester







Lunch Club is now in its eighth year and is enjoyed by diners and volunteers alike.

Lunch Club provides a hot main course, dessert, tea and coffee for £4. Membership is open to anyone over the age of 60 who Builth, Llanelwedd, lives in Aberedw, Builth Road, and Cwmbach

Each meal takes about 25 hours of volunteer time to prepare and serve. Jobs have been broken down into bite sized pieces so that nobody feels overwhelmed and everyone can be included whatever their level of skill. All meals are cooked entirely by volunteers.

Lunch club occasionally guest has speakers from local organisations, who give presentations or come to have an informal chat with the diners

February 2020 unfortunately saw the Lunch Club put on hold due to flooding damage to the Jubilee Hall. This was quickly followed by the Covid-19 lockdown in March which meant the Lunch Club was put on an extended hiatus. We look forward to seeing everyone back in the (hopefully!) not-too-distant future.



Other Services

Community Work

As part of our important place in the community, our manager attends meetings with other organisations and statutory agencies - local and county wide to discuss developments and partnership working to ensure that our community benefits from any new initiatives.

One of our "shop front" windows is available to other organisations to promote their services and events.

Monthly Outings

We provide monthly day trips for older or disabled people who are unable to join other organised trips. The outings take place on the last Thursday of each month and the destinations are varied. Our Volunteers provide all the support needed and use their own vehicles to provide door to door transport for members.

Office Support

We usually have a Volunteer helping in the office during our public opening hours as we have a steady stream of callers to the office; requests for our services, enquiries about Volunteering, Volunteers for their tasks etc. it is very varied and the Volunteers who provide office support find it interesting to see at first hand all we provide.

Befriending

Befriending covers a multitude of services, such as dog walking, collecting prescriptions, and some requests are in response to a particular need - where someone needs assistance until they recover from an illness or bereavement, some are long term where support with

In 2019/20, the shop was run by manager Cathy Warlow, co-ordinator Lesley Wootton and shift supervisors Betty Cansdale, Ingrid Gallagher, Sue Seed & Tricia Skyrme.

The shop provides BWCS with an essential source of income as without this we would not be able to provide our services. It is also valuable asset to our town, offering a variety of goods at reasonable prices and of course a great place to volunteer.
